

Light requirements (in this case full sun to part shade)





Aster, Skyblue Symphyotrichum oolentangiense

\$6 / 3.5 in. pot
Benefits birds, bees, butterflies & other insect pollinators
Deer resistant
Blooms: August-October
Full sun to part shade
Soil: Medium to dry, well-drained
Height: 2 – 3 feet
Spread: 18 - 24 inches



Some of the wildlife that benefit from this plant. You may see bees, butterflies, moths, squirrels, hummingbirds and fruit-eating birds. Descriptions are not exhaustive. In fact, most of the perennials will provide food for birds right through the winter. Don't clean your garden in the fall! Denotes a keystone species, one that has a disproportionately large effect on its environment relative to its abundance. Search for an article by Catherine Zimmerman in the Yellow Springs News (ysnews.com) for a excellent explanation of these special native plants. The asters, goldenrods, milkweeds, oaks, and many other plants in this sale are examples of keystone species.
